A Note to Self (Rewritten)



Certainly, you know that the expense of a high quality education is not contained only to AA male students. However, based on what you read, they are the group of students most at risk of dropping out of college and thus less likely to achieve the American dream -- a better and richer and fuller life. The more you read and learn, the more you are driven to run faster and harder to help improve opportunities for the AA male student to succeed. You are humbled and ever so grateful that God has seen fit to give you ideas and instructions, in the form of other people, to help you in your efforts. Their help demonstrates that they too believe that the more we help our AA students, the more we give them hope and make opportunity possible. You cannot thank the donors enough for helping plant seeds to encouragement because you know within your heart that seeds of discouragement cannot take root in a grateful heart -- the students or yours. Each and every day, you applaud our students for not quitting on themselves and applaud the givers of the gifts for not quitting on our students. As you wind down this year, you look forward to implementing the much awaited Leadership Mentoring Program pilot at Gwynn Park HS; and, to making greater strides to award much more financial aid and provide more outreach to many, many more than the 15 young men that the givers of the gifts have helped to date. 
